Chain Saw Awareness Training

A big thank you to Neil Ellison for coordinating the NSW SES and Andrew Squire for coordinating the access and convoy into Talooge.

Also a huge big thank you to Andrew Daniels and Tim Miller from the SES who volunteered to impart their knowledge to our students



The following are comments and feedback from the students.

I have been looking forward to doing the chainsaw training course for years but other commitments, like holidays, kept conspiring against me. Finally this year Andy, with a borrowed chainsaw and accoutrements (thanks Rob D), and I could do the course (me with my Stihl "Mini Boss"). Thanks to our SES instructors Tim, Andrew and Neil (also a club member) who lead us through the techniques, safety and maintenance of using our saws. They then monitored and instructed us individually to attack fallen timber and slice and dice it safely, without getting the blade stuck. Lots of stuff about t's and c's (tension and compression), notch and offset cuts, kickback, and other stuff that I remember how to do but not the terms for. After lunch we watched Neil use a chainsaw and wedges (not the edible kind) to cut and then break through a log that was more than twice the width of the chainsaw's bar, commencing with a bore cut. That was impressive and we got to try out the bore cut, which was great fun. I learnt how to sharpen and maintain my chainsaw, but still can't start it when it is cold, and I am still very, very grateful to my chainsaw fairy Andy who tends to do all that stuff for me (but I should really do that myself). The course was tremendous fun and the following day I got to practice with a "hanger" and to fell a branch, which just consolidated the previous day's learning (but highlighted that I need some more practice as the other end of the saw I couldn't see wasn't meeting up with the horizontal cut as was the side I could see). Overall, a great fun course and I also recommend the MINI BOSS and an extremely effective, reliable and lightweight chainsaw.

We had the best weather imaginable, and the club group was, as always, very friendly, open and positive. A great weekend, with some very useful learnings, and chances to make some new friends. Thanks again to our SES friends."

The chainsaw course started off with a theory session in the morning to run through the basics and to get to know the chainsaws and the differences you may find between the different brands. After a short smoko/morning tea we were split into groups of four and we set off to our locations to do some cutting and learn techniques. After 2 hours of cutting we all had some lunch and those who wanted to, sharpened their saws. After lunch we gathered together to learn how

to sharpen our chainsaw chains. We then set off again for the afternoon session to do some more cutting. After cutting we learnt how to properly clean and maintain our saw by stripping them apart and cleaning the components. Unlike others, my saw had that much build up of oil and wood chips it needed a lot more attention. I took Neil, Andy and myself to pull it apart completely to give it a proper clean which took 45mins to do so.

All in all I believe this is a terrific course that is well set out. It was great to be able to absorb so much information off the SES volunteers and it is a huge credit to them on the way they assisted everyone participating. I was able to go from no experience on a chainsaw to being comfortable when having to use one and the techniques required to do the task at hand. Highly recommend members to participate in this training in the future.

I owned a chain saw some time ago, which I used a couple of time and killed it but didn't know why? I was very curious to know the reason. I thought it was a cheap brand and was not meant to cut wood. Then I bought my second chain saw which was a highly regarded brand in 2013. This was in the box until I attended the 2019 chainsaw course. The knowledge that I gathered was very valuable. Mainly in the theory section, the SES staff taught us how to handle, maintain and fueling up chain saws. Also different kinds of chain saws and how important is to wear protective gear. After the theory class our task was to clear a fallen tree we had to work in pairs to get the job done. When we got to the site our first job was to assess the situation, clear some space around for quick withdrawal and make sure there are no tangling branches around the working area. We had to pay attention, when cutting the branches under the trunk because removing them could destabilise the tree, in some situations these branches can help keep the saw away from dirt. Under the guidance of SES we were able to practice different methods of cutting so that we wouldn't get the saw stuck in the tree. We worked in pairs and got the tree cleared from the imaginary path. The tree was real but not the path. Also the SES demonstrated on how to saw a big tree using wedges so that the saw wouldn't get stuck. Our last assignment was about maintenance and cleaning. I have to thank the SES for sharing this valuable knowledge and experience with us and a big thankyou to the club to organising the training. Now I know why I killed my chain saw.

Arriving on Friday evening after a nice pizza at Bredbo we did set camp to start training at 8am. Our three SES instructors, Tim, Neil and Mat, shared a wealth of knowledge and did provide us some understanding to clear fallen trees while travelling in the bush. We learned how to assess the risks level associated to trees clearing in a controlled manner in various terrains.

The first part of the course help us to identify the various chainsaws and mode of operation then the important OH&S such as use of protective clothing, correct body posture, pre start

checks sharpening, tensioning to ensure safe outcome when working alone as well as the importance of clear communication with another buddy to keep safe.

We then moved on to practice cutting logs . We had some green and dried hard timber/logs of various shape to enable us to learn the numerous cutting methods to use under different circumstances as to avoid accidents and chain saw malfunctions

We finished the training by learning how to clean our chain saw, conduct routine check, maintenance and store our equipment.

It was a great informative training with a lot of camaraderie.

Sunday we did collect some of the timber back to the main shed.

Key tips learnt from the weekend:

- Use the dogs at the base of the bar. Pivot on these to reduce the weight of the saw and make life easier
- Consider where you stand. Gravity is your friend but only if you are in the right place.
- How to sharpen your chain. A sharp chain makes the world of difference.
- Butter both sides of your bread if you want your toastie to come out of the iron

Talooge was beautiful as always and with 12 chainsaws on the day should have plenty of firewood

NPWS has a new online volunteer management system called VIP. Please follow the instruction below to register in the system. The process should take 5-10 minutes.


1. Go to this link: <https://www.environment.nsw.gov.au/volunteers/VolunteersInformationForm.htm>



Camp Cooking Recipes

Beer and Fruit Damper

Ingredients

1-1/2 cups self-raising flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
2 tablespoons butter
Dried mixed fruit or sultanas
350-360ml beer

Method

Add the baking powder to the flour and mix.

Rub the butter into the flour. Add the mixed fruit or sultanas.

Then add about a third of the bottle of beer and mix. Keep adding beer until you get a soft mix.

Place it into a lightly greased tin so it keeps its shape, and then bake it in your camp oven on hot coals for about 40 minutes.

Damper Tips

1. You may need slightly more or less beer than the ingredients suggest but the mixture should be able to hold its shape in the dish.
2. Score the dough deeply with a knife to make it easier to break it into segments when cooked.
3. Never try to cook damper over flames, only ever with coals.
4. Damper is great smothered with butter or drizzled with golden syrup, it is always best eaten while hot.
5. If you are a complete beginner, just buy a packet of commercial damper mix from the store, mix it as per the directions, and it will still be delicious.
6. Measure and mix dry damper ingredients before leaving home, store them in an air-tight container or in a plastic bag ready for use. This will take up less room than carrying separate ingredients and saves time in preparation.
