Talooge Park

Talooge is the Club's 700+ ha bush block in rugged country east of Bredbo. It is used for club activities and members are welcome there for camping and enjoying the bush. Areas are set aside for basic bush camping. Some have firewood, but no other services – no water, no electricity, no phone, very limited mobile phone coverage.

Pets and the discharging of firearms are not permitted on the property. Visitors should assume that they are solely responsible for their own wellbeing and be conscious of the risks of fire, snakebite, etc. In an emergency, neighbours Mr. Richie Southwell and his sons, can usually be contacted using UHF Ch. 18.

Members are urged to inform the Property Coordinator or President of their plans to visit Talooge as from time to time the club allows use by other organisations. Your visit may also coincide with maintenance activities that may pose health hazards (for example, aerial weed spraying). You can then be informed if there are any issues to be aware or confirm combinations for locks to the property including our clubhouse.

Code of Ethics

These are the rules of conduct that we should all observe when using our vehicles in the bush. We should all take them to heart. Image is a difficult thing to change!!

- 1. Obey the laws and regulations for Recreational Vehicles that apply to public lands.
- 2. Respect the cultural, heritage and environmental values of public/private land, by obeying restrictions that may apply.
- 3. Respect our flora and fauna. Stop and look, but never disturb.
- 4. Keep to formed vehicle tracks.
- 5. Keep the environment clean. Carry your own, and any other, rubbish out.
- 6. Keep your vehicle mechanically sound and clean to reduce the environmental impact.
- 7. Adopt minimal impact camping and driving practices.
- 8. Seek permission before driving on private land. Do not disturb livestock or watering points, leave gates as found.
- 9. Take adequate water, food, fuel, basic spares and a first aid kit on trips. In remote areas travel with another vehicle and have Royal Flying Doctor Service, or equivalent, in radio contact.
- 10. Enjoy your recreation and respect the rights of others.
- 11. Plan ahead and lodge trip details with a responsible person.
- 12. Support four wheel driving as a responsible and legitimate family recreational activity.

Season's Greetings!

Welcome to the final Southern Trails for 2012. We do not publish in January so the next edition will be February 2013. We still have our general meeting on Tuesday 8 January.

Thanks to Rob Dobson for doing such a great talk at short notice at our last meeting on snakes and the treatment of snake bite. A topic we should all take seriously as it is relevant for our 4wdriving and camping more so in the hotter months. Particularly, with a sighting of a brown snake near the fire pit at Talooge. Do you have your pressure immobilisation bandages in your 4wd or backpack? Do you know what to do? From my St John Australian First Aid book the key steps are:

- Follow DRABC (check for Danger, check Response, check Airway, check for Breathing and check for signs of Circulation)
- Rest and calm the casualty
- Apply pressure immobilisation bandage
- Splint the bandaged limb
- Ensure casualty does not move
- Seek medical aid urgently

Venom from snake bite moves through our lymphatic system so applying pressure, bandaging and splinting bitten limbs helps to ensure little movement which is critical for survival. Don't wash the bite. Cutting the bite and trying to suck the venom out is no longer a recommended practise and has not been for many years. Similarly, tourniquets are also not recommended to treat snake bites.

I can only touch on this serious subject here. Please seek more information about the do's and don'ts of snakes and snake bites for yourself. Make sure you get the appropriate bandages, carry them with you and know how to use them. Study the recommended first aid approaches or keep a list handy in the 4wd. I hope to have more in depth articles published in future editions.

PS. Well, what a fantastic weekend we had at the Christmas Party. The weather was great, the location just right and the company wonderful - almost eighty members attended the weekend.



Fuel: Full at start. Trip distance is over 700km, so a refuel in Eden is probably the best option.

Maps: Rooftop's Merimbula-Bermagui and Mallacoota-Merimbula Adventure Maps or 8724 Bombala

NSW Topo 1:100,000 and 8824 National Topo Series Bega 1:100,000

Requirements: UHF radio and well-maintained vehicle and the usual food, water and Happy Hour provisions.

Description: This trip is intended as a scenic, social and relaxing weekend drive with an overnight at an Eden

caravan park (to be decided - fee involved). Your choice of accommodation - once you have booked on the event, please let us know your intentions. We will aim to book a group area for carbased camping, but if you would like a van or cabin, you may need to book that yourselves. We

will also try to secure some discount. Stand by for updates.

On Saturday, we'll head off the black top at Nimmitabel, by the disused Goulburn-Bombala railway line, and then travel through South East Forrest National Park, checking out Nunnock Camping Area and Nunnock Swamp, Alexander's Hut, lovely Candelo and on through Wolumla to Wolumla Peak (excellent 360 degree views including to the sea), arriving at Eden in time for Happy Hour and a Pot Luck dinner.

On Sunday, we'll head down to Ben Boyd National Park (\$7 day use fee) and check out Boyd's Tower and Green Cape Lighthouse (the end points for the Light-to-Light Walk) plus Disaster Bay. Then from Kiah, we'll take The Snake Track through wonderfully picturesque scenery along the Towamba River, through Towamba, Burragate, and Rocky Hall to Cathcart and then farming paddocks with lots of stock to Bibbenluke and the leisurely drive back home.

Off-road sections are Grade 1 and therefore suitable for members who have not yet completed the Basic course. Even so, some of the roads will be rough, narrow, winding and dusty enough that

you wouldn't take the family sedan!

ABOUT TRIPS

TRIP GRADING

For trips in the club's calendar a grading system of levels 1 to 5 is used to assist members in deciding which trips they would most enjoy and which grade suits the driver's level of skill and experience. This system of grading is a guide only. The grade assigned to a trip may change due to weather conditions, and the trip leader should be consulted in such circumstances. The trip leader has the right to deny a request from a driver who is considered not to have the necessary level of skill in 4Wdriving,or whose vehicle is deemed inadequate.

*GRADE 1: very easy with little, if any 4wdriving involved; will usually consist of a scenic

tour or a trip to camp. No 4WD skills are needed.

*GRADE 2: a relatively moderate 4WD trip with winching and/or towing unlikely. Moderate

level of 4WD skills needed, as well as completion of Basic Driver Education

Course.

*GRADE 3: a medium 4WD trip which requires cautious driving; winching should not be

required. Good level of 4WD skills needed, as well as completion of Basic Driver

Education Course.

*GRADE 4: a moderately difficult 4WD trip with some winching and/or towing almost a

certainty. High level of 4WD skills needed, as well as completion of both the

Basic and Advanced Driver Education Courses.

*GRADE 5: an extremely difficult 4WD trip. Participants must be experienced at traveling

over difficult terrain. Winching and/or towing will definitely be required and participants must have all their own recovery equipment. Skill levels the same as

Grade 4.

DRIVER EXPERIENCE

Conditions on some trips at Grade 3 and above may prove too difficult for inexperienced drivers. Please advise the trip leader of the level of skill, and vehicle equipment when signing up for such a trip. Members must have attended the 'Safe-One' Basic Vehicle Operation Course before driving on a Club trip above the Grade 1 level, unless they have satisfied the Club's Education Coordinator that they have the necessary experience.

TRIP PLANNING

If you are planning a Trip or Social Event for the Club contact the Club Trips Co-ordinator, preferably at least two months in advance of your chosen dates. This will allow time to give your event a 'good plug' in the Southern Trails, and it helps to avoid clashes with other people's plans. However, if a good event opportunity comes up at short notice our rules are sufficiently flexible to enable a quick approval. Club policy requires that a Club event shall be publicised in the Club magazine, or at a General Meeting of the Club, or on the Club's website in order for it to be considered a formal Club event and so be covered for the purposes of insurance, subsidies and so forth.

For a trip using tracks that are not public roads it is Club policy to confirm with the appropriate authorities that access is permitted on the chosen dates. This includes National Parks, State Forests as well as private property.

UHF RADIOS

The Club strongly recommends that a UHF radio be carried to facilitate convoy procedures. UHF channel 14 is used as the standard channel for trips.

FIREARMS & PETS

Firearms are not permitted on club trips. Pets are not allowed in National Parks, otherwise refer to Trip leader.

quite a few water crossings at varying depths (blinds may be required). The mountain environment can change at any time so be prepared for hot and possibly cold extreme conditions. Camping will be at differerent sites. Long drops are available at all camp sites but not showers. Hot showers will be available at Ensay, Licola and Mansfield. There is a possibility that some vehicle recoveries

may be required

Pre-trip briefing

Training started at the compulsory pre-trip briefing on 12 September, by which time the 25 enrolled had already dropped to 19. The briefing covered some critical advice – you will get wet, you need to get under the car and check and plug holes to avoid wet carpets, bring a spinifex hook (perhaps this was in case the river was really dry?), check your snorkel actually snorkels and your door seals seal, etc. Plus some really good advice on the interaction between water depth, flow and the side of your 4WD.

River crossing

The early birds led by Peter Watson met in Braidwood at 07.30 while those of us who preferred more of a sleep in met Duck in Queanbeyan at 08.30. From the 19 at the compulsory briefing night, we had lost another five in the interim and were down to 14.

A quick pit-stop in Braidwood and then on to Baker's Camp for a briefing by Duck, which concluded with tales of cars turned submarines and water discos. Some very salient anecdotes to accompany the advice 'No one is forcing you to do anything. If you don't want to go as deep or go at all, it's your decision". Then on to Dry Creek for the main event (the presence of a trainer in a dry suit doing nothing to allay nerves). A wander up and down the river to judge depth and pick lines, time to spray oil on critical electricals and affix tarps, and then, in we went. When one thinks about river crossings, the 'crossing' part tends to be assumed. It is then somewhat of a surprise to find yourself driving up the river itself before exiting about 200m upstream with your 'line' marked by a series of drunken water nymphs. I say drunken because they obviously had difficulty standing still and appeared to wander all over the place ('nymphs' is probably a bit of a far cry). Either the tide was coming in, they were getting shorter or we were going deeper with each pass. Three passes in one direction and two in reverse and success! Of course, it wasn't all good news - while relatively picturesque, I wasn't convinced the small fountains from the floor of the Prado were a good thing someone else had a much more impressive water fountain coming out the rear doors. We also unfortunately lost Alex on the way back who decided discretion was the better part of valour and his Hilux traveled back from Araleun courtesy of NRMA.

The training was fantastic, however, rather than convince me to do more water crossings, it has convinced me to do less (but with more preparation and care). While a 4WD can, at various times, plough through deep water, float and create a bow wave, I have concluded that if this is what you really want to do – buy a boat.

Sand Driving

After camping overnight at Stuarts Crossing and a quick theory lesson, we headed off onto the sand with tyres at road pressures. This really showed up the difference in the capability of the vehicles with some bogging within 10m and others only getting stuck when they hit the really soft stuff.

This was followed by a second lap with lowered pressures to demonstrate the difference tyre pressure makes (substantial). It was then time to bog the vehicles so we could practice getting them out.

River Crossing and Sand Driving

Cue, lots of digging, rocking, MaxTraxs and the occasional snatch strap.

27-28 October 2012

Once again vehicle capabilities came to the fore with the Prado drivers being told to 'go and see if you can bog it'. After all the Prado's failed this relatively simple test, the trainer's were more than happy to provide a solution. No matter what vehicle you drive, if you reverse into a soft sand river you will get well and truly bogged. Not quite what one expects to deliberately do with an expensive bit of motor vehicle. It then becomes rather difficult to 'dig' the vehicle out as quicksand doesn't tend to sit nicely on a shovel. It was also just as well we had earlier talked about attaching straps to MaxTraxs as all that was left after one successful vehicle extraction were the tips of two straps poking out of the river.

Once all the vehicles had been bogged and debogged, we had a quick demo of what to do (or should that have been, what not to do?) when changing a tyre.

Points to note

- When crossing a river in a 4WD, floating is actually a really bad thing
- Duck by name but not by nature
- A little bit of water can get in your air filter housing and you can survive (not something that should be tested too often or at all)
- Small bubbling fountains in the floor are not a good thing – water fountains out the doors are much more impressive but probably not a good thing either
- Dry Creek isn't dry
- Don't forget to plug the duck's bum (important note: does not refer to Duck's bum)
- It's really hard to run away from a Tiger snake when wearing waders and standing waist deep in a river (and if you happen to be driving your 4WD through the river at the time, you probably shouldn't stop to watch).

The course definitely deserves its reputation as one of the most sought after the club runs.

Have You Checked Your Trailer Connectors Lately?

The picture below illustrates the dust and mud accumulated in my trailer connector after a 15,000 km trip; the connector had been cleaned out immediately before the trip.

I had cleaned this connector out several times in the past and found that if the dust turns to wet mud then the exposed electrical terminals will form a circuit through the mud. Although in most cases the current flowing is only small, it does create a degree of corrosion on the terminals, they turn green, and may cause the wires not to make adequate contact with the terminals.

A few years ago one of our club members was on a trip through dusty iron-ore country in Western Australia. The iron-ore dust that had accumulated in his trailer connector turned out to be highly conductive and he ended up blowing a fuse that in turn caused his engine to stop immediately.

This resulted in him being stuck in the middle of nowhere, with no idea as to what the problem was. He was fortunate in that some time later mining staff from a nearby mine drove by, stopped and were able to help him get going again.

To reduce the possibility of a similar problem happening to me I have now cleaned the connector out thoroughly, checked the tightness of all wire connections and then put a layer of Selly's Marine Silicone over all of the exposed terminals and conductors. That way there will be no unexpected circuits formed through the dust and mud. I can cut the silicone away if I need to get to the terminals. Be careful to use a good quality silicone as some products will remain sticky, attract dust and even run in very hot weather.

- The 4WD Adventure show at Eastern Creek is now the largest 4WD show in Australia with 205 exhibitors and over 16,000 paying visitors through the gates in just 2 days
- We have also increased the use of our Training Centre for driver training and assessment
- Overlander Magazine wants to use our Training Centre as its standard test track for all new vehicles
- Association net assets now amount to about \$114,000 with a current account balance of \$38,000
- Your committee also approved funding to strengthen our DTU through upgrading our trainers' qualifications. This is a major effort that will directly benefit all members of all clubs. We must ensure that all clubs make training available to their members and complete full skills evaluations so that the DTU can issue certificates of competency. New trainers are always welcome
- Our role in modifying GMH's new Holden Rodeo ad to demonstrate safe recovery practices strengthened our credibility as the peak 4WD representative body. GMH were so impressed with our contribution that they asked to make a training video with us. The DTU were heavily involved in filming this at our Eastern Creek Training Centre. (see YouTube or 4wdTV)
- Our major role in the inaugural Motor Enthusiasts Conference (Eastern Creek February 2012)
- Positive meetings with state politicians at regular intervals (evidenced by changes to RMS)
- Launch of the new improved website www.4wdnow.com to overcome the issues with the old website and give a fresh and modern look to the Association. This has resulted in greater public awareness of our organisation and has driven some of the new club formation enquiries

- Establishing a series of discount offers (20-30% off) for members; accessible through our website
- Improved insurance rates for members with a small commission returned to clubs.

How we fund these achievements has been a question concerning your committee for some time. The Association has three income streams;

- Affiliation fees from clubs
- Training activities income
- The 4WD Adventure Show

Your committee seeks new ways to meet our operating costs of about \$80,000pa. How Waterproof is Your Camping Gear?

Water resistance of fabrics is usually expressed as the height of a column of water that the fabric can support before the fabric starts to leak. You may see this as '1000 mm PU coating' which means that the fabric will support a column of water of one metre or 1000 mm in height. (PU stands for Poly Urethane.) In British publications you may see HH2000mm in which case the HH stands for Hydrostatic Head. This may be converted to pounds per square inch in US documents.

Hydrostatic pressure testing of fabrics is usually conducted by sealing the fabric over the bottom end of a vertical one-inch diameter tube and then gradually filling the tube with water until the fabric starts to leak. The height of water at which the leakage began is the water resistance figure for that fabric.

Those who attended the October 2012 ST4WDC meeting saw demonstrations of two different '3 second' tents; the first tent was an EPE Speedy two person tent which had a water resistance rating of 1000mm for the fly and 2000mm for the floor. The second tent was a Malamoo three person tent which had a water resistance rating of 1500mm for the fly and 3000mm for the floor. Top of the line two and three person tents have fly water resistance ratings of 3,500mm and floor water resistance ratings of 10,000mm or even greater, however these tents are 3 to 4 times more expensive than the tents shown in the October meeting.





How water resistant does your tent need to be? The trouble is that not all rain is equal in the pressure it exerts on the tent fabrics; drizzle exerts very little pressure whereas tropical rain drops can be large and have a high velocity, exerting a much larger pressures on the fabric. Another factor is the amount of flex in the fabric when a rain drop hit it. There seems to be little agreement on any fixed number but it appears that anything around 1-2000mm is considered rainproof. I would be going for the higher number if all other things were equal.

No matter how water resistant a tent fabric is, in cold climates condensation will form inside the top of the tent unless care is taken. Hot air rises and on a cold night your moisture laded breath will rise to the top of the tent and condense into water.

The way to reduce or stop condensation is to have a tent with openings at the highest point and to leave these open through the night so that the moist hot air will keep rising right out of the opening. The trick is to have enough warmth in your sleeping systems so that you do not need to zip the tent and all of the windows up just to keep warm. This practice can save you a few hours in the mornings waiting for you tent to dry.

I also found that putting the fly on my Oz Tent RV4 considerably reduced the internal condensation. My guess is that the trapped layer of air between the top of the tent and the fly provided a degree of insulation that caused the ceiling of the tent to be warmer than it would have been without the fly and hence reduced the level of condensation.

There are tents made with a 'breathable' water resistant fabric, however these are very expensive. The subject of water resistant, breathable and windproof jackets will be covered in a future article.

Interesting Information



- If you are right handed, you will tend to chew your food on the rightside of your mouth.
- If you are left handed, you will tend to chew your food on the left side of your mouth.



MEMBERSHIP

Categories of Membership

Full details of the categories of Membership of the Southern Tablelands Four Wheel Drive Club Inc. (ST4WDC) can be found in the Constitution of the club. The following is a summary of the key differences:

'Owner Member'

Owner membership of the Club may be open to any person interested in the furtherance of the objects of the Club, who is an owner or part owner (at least 10%) of a four wheel drive vehicle registered in Australia. The partner of an owner-member has all the privileges of an owner-member.

'Associate Member'

Any person interested in the furtherance of the objects of the Club may be eligible for associate membership and entitled to vote at any general meeting but shall not be entitled to a vote at the annual general meeting or at any special general meeting. An associate member is not able to be a committee member of the club.

'Competition Member'

Any person interested in the furtherance of the objects of the Club but wishing to join the club for the principal purpose of participating in 4WD competition events may join as a 'Competition Member'. A competition member is not entitled to a vote at the annual general meeting or at any special general meeting, and is not able to be a committee member.

'Family Member'

Family membership is extended free of charge to those persons who are the immediate family of an Owner Member or an Associate Member provided that they are under the age of 21 and are domiciled under the same roof. Family Members who have already completed the Basic Driver Training course are entitled to a 50% reduction in the Owner Member Joining Fee provided they become Owner Members before their 22nd birthday.

'Life Member'

Life membership of the Club may be extended to any owner member who has been a member of the Club continuously for at least 10 years and has in the opinion of the Club Committee, contributed significantly to the endeavours of the club. Life members pay no annual membership fee.

Approval of Membership

Applications for membership of the ST4WDC are subject to approval by the club committee. The Club reserves the right to refuse a person membership. Reasons may be given at a meeting of the committee and the applicant.

Membership Entitlements

Membership of the ST4WDC entitles Owner Members (including Partners), and licensed Registered Family of Owner Members to attend the Club's training courses and to make use of the Clubs 700ha property Talooge Park. Participation as a driver on other than Grade 1 trips requires successful completion of the Basic Driver Training course, or recognised equivalent prior learning / qualification approved by the Club's Education Coordinator. Grades 4 and 5 trips also require advanced training. Details of Trip Grading can be found in **Southern Trails**, the Club magazine issued monthly (except January) to all Owner Members, Associate Members and Life Members.

Membership Fees

An initial joining fee and an annual membership fee are payable as follows:

- Plus Annual Membership. A re-joining Member may be entitled to a reduced Joining Fee.
- The Annual Membership Fee for new applications received after the July General Meeting is reduced to \$50.

The Club membership year extends from 1 January to 31 December.
