Something New or Unusual

Hi folks well this month I've gone with a mixed bag of newish and unusual gear.

Glow in Dark Tent Ropes

Yep I'm not joking you can buy glow in the dark tent ropes. These are a great idea if you, like me, are starting to loose that once superb night vision, or you happen to partake in campfire activities that blur the vision. They stand out, don't require any power source and come in all your favourite Hi-Vis colours (green and orange)



Oh and you can also get these little numbers – glow in the dark tent rope tensioners

Or go overboard and get both!

Cost – the ropes are between \$6.50 and \$12.50 on ebay and the tensioners are around \$2.00

Winch Rope Retainer Loop

I recently watched with interest as one of our members who spent considerable time reconnecting their winch rope which had unspooled off the drum. There has to be a better way I thought and yes there is.



The Tough Winch Rope Retainer Loop from **Tough Toys**, is a simple device which makes the use of a winch much safer. As the winch rope is un-spooled off the drum it is possible for the winch rope to be torn free. In most cases, a winch rope is generally held with a small bolt or grub screw.

The winch rope retainer prevents the winch rope from unspooling past 3 rounds of rope at the end of the drum. It does this by causing the rope to pull friction around the drum.

Tough Toys reckon that After testing and using the winch rope retainer they strongly recommend it for use with both synthetic winch rope and steel winch cable. Instead of attaching your winch rope directly to the drum, install the winch rope retainer on the first layer close to the winch rope terminal end.

A GPS Unit that won't kill the Bank Account

If you are in the market for a GPS unit, but don't want to pay \$600 plus for a famous brand name unit, there is an alternative that has been tested on many a Club trip with success.



The XGody 7" GPS Navigation unit from our good friends in China can be purchased from ebay for around \$70. You will then need to purchase an OziExplorer CE License for \$40. Load the OziExplorer software on the XGody Unit and add your own maps or purchase them from various suppliers. You are now right to go. Not too sure if

you can handle doing this on your own? No problems, there are a number of members in the Club that can help you set it up and give you the basics. Contact Michael at trips@ST4WDC.com.au and he will help out.

For a "ready to go" brand name unit go to www.hema.com.au and check out their new HX-1 unit or the older HN7 unit. The older version is compatible with current Map formats used by most club members and is currently reduced in price as they run out. HX-1 costs around \$699 but you can pick them up for \$599 if you shop around and the HN7 units are selling for \$499.

We had an early start to the trip with a meet and greet at the Eaglehawk on the Federal Highway at 7.45am. Our first stop was at the Taralga town park for a bathroom break amid a very cold wind and typical Taralga bitter chill. Before we knew it, were sitting around enjoying a beautiful raging fire thanks to Grahame. Before long, the camp ovens were brought out and strategically placed in the coals in preparation for a well earned meal at the end of a great day. Conversation flowed well into the night with the echo of Lynne and her fellow campers laughter filling the night air.

We woke to a spectacular day with blue skies and the sun shining. Some campers went on a town tour looking through old buildings and relics and imagining what life would have been like in the old mining days. Other campers looked around the site and went for a bush walk to the old mine site where a bridge had been constructed over an old mine shaft. Old equipment lay dormant in the bush evidence of a bygone era.

With a scheduled 11am departure we headed to the town cemetery passing the church, courthouse, police station and school as well as a rough old air strip. We had a walk around the cemetery discovering that the oldest person was 67 years of age confirming the fact that life in the mines would have been very tough. We then headed for our lunch destination, Mount Werong camp ground via a sensitive geological site where some discussion took place around a 'spear sharpening hollow' in the rock. Much to Chris's disappointment we pushed on through morning tea to have lunch at Mount Werong.

After lunch, we headed for home via Pat and Kirsty Gurnang where we came across some snow on the side of the road and Lynne treated us all to a little snow play. The scenery between Gurnang and Taralga was just spectacular with beautiful views across the mountains and valleys. We departed ways in Taralga after an enjoyable weekend thanks to Lynne and Rob's organisation and trip leading.

The Yerranderie trip, via Wombeyan Caves, was a relaxed, easy driving, scenic meander through Kanangra-Boyd National Park. Excellent trip

leaders and company made for an enjoyable weekend, with beautiful weather as an added bonus. The camp ground at Yerranderie was spacious, and the quasi-preserved village well worth exploring. There are plenty of walks around, including up to the ruins of one of the silver mine, and I think we all want to return with more time to explore - the more adventurous to climb to the spur overlooking the village. As we left on the Sunday we drove to the cemetery which has been partially restored. A bit eerie as it seems those that died were either 9 or 67 years old! Great trip, great location, and a must-return for us.

On a cold Saturday morning we left Eaglehawk Carpark at 0745 for the first part of the trip via Goulburn, Taralga for a bladder stop and on to Wombeyan for morning tea and a tour Wollondilly Cave.

After a pretty cold night, we had a tour of the town with our local guide, then walked up to look over the mine shaft, which at over 400 metres down was pretty impressive. It is not until you walk up out of the valley that you can see the scale of the mining, but also the spectacular views offer by the surrounding volcano rim. This area is well worth going back to.

The drive out was under perfect skies and offered fantastic views again. We stopped at a rock ledge

for group photos and a view of an area where the first Australians utilised a rock ledge for what looked like spear sharpening, which would have been useful given the number of wallabies in the valley below. When then moved on to Mount Werong for a well-deserved lunch and cuppa, (to make up for the eleveners that Thomas had missed out on) and then drove out of the Blue Mountains national park to find snow!!! What a great find, it was everywhere, or so it seemed. We stopped for a snow ball fight and some photos, then made our way back to the Taralga road where air was reintroduced to the tires and we headed for home.

We made it into Goulburn with 5 litres in the tank and a finance committee decision that the next big purchase would be a long range tank.

Thanks to Lynne and Rob for organising this trip. It was a great way for a newbie to get to know some fantastic people and enjoy our great outdoors.

way out showed it wasn't all beer and skittles way back then, and we were on to lunch at XXXXXX. This was a great stop, with plenty of room off the road for the group.



Having visited Old Andado a number of times, I have been frustrated by not having the right gear or tools to fix little things while there. So when approached by David and Helen Sutton to assist as camp host at Old Andado for the month of July 2017 I was in.

We had 3 main projects in mind to do while there

One

Install a relief vent to the donkey boiler, this was necessary because others had replaced the old metal tank with a new poly tank. In the process removing the vent and not replacing it. Subsequently, when you fired up the donkey boiler too much, without water flowing through it, the cisterns filled with boiling water. It was an accident waiting to happen.

Two


Replace the shower roses as they faced towards the doors wetting everything in the cubicles.

Three

Replace all the toilet cisterns, there was a variety of types and vintages of cistern which meant that it was difficult to repair them. We put the word out for help and thanks to Rob and Lynne Donaldson (Around Town Plumbing) they were able to

get new cisterns donated by Reece Plumbing Belconnen. ST4WDC donated a roll of copper to the project.

We arrived a day early to enable us to settle in and prepare to start our duties as caretakers, relieving the incumbent caretaker Cobby, that's when the fun began. Cobby Bob as he was known around the place, was not a person that took well to being told what was going to happen, he was more of a "do as I say type of guy" or I will shoot you.



But a couple of days of action on our part had Cobby on our side, even to the point where he left us while he went off for a few days to help out at Mt Dare

Before we had even started in our official capacity as caretaker we noticed that the septic system was over flowing, this was due mainly to, lack of maintenance and the high volume of tourists that were coming through and camping. The cleaning of the septic system was to take all our efforts for the entire time we spent at Old Andado.

Camp carers are given a list of tasks that need attending to while you are there, these include.

- welcoming tourists, and ensuring there is a hot cuppa and scones on the go
- keep the amenities block tidy and supplied with toilet paper
- turn the generator on at night to pump water to the tank
- collect fire wood for the donkey and stove
- grade the air strip regularly, you never know when it may be needed
- keep the house clean, there are no windows so keeping the dust down is a battle
- And any small maintenance items that need attention that you are able to do.

So how did we go?

We achieved our three main tasks

Helen made 33 batches of scones



When not working on the septic we also managed to

- replace all the taps to the basins, showers and cisterns
- replaced all the outlet pipes from the septic
- trimmed the tree from over hanging the dongas
- welded and repaired the BBQ plates in the camp ground
- cleaned the ash and rubbish from the fire pits daily
- cleaned the cupboards of mice droppings and dust
- washed all the linen and blankets
- repaired and built fences

- installed an overflow pipe from
 the absorption pit of the
 shower block to the sewer line
- replaced all the old gal pipework to the shower block with copper pipe
- replaced old brass ball valves with new poly ball valves to stop them from seizing
- installed a ball valve to the outlet of the tank as there wasn't one to shut it off
- replaced the leaking pipe to the bush swampy
- repaired the blocked laundry outlet pipe
- replaced the bore line to the tank where it was above ground
- trimmed and tidied the gardens
- cleaned up the tank stand area
- repaired doors , kitchen cupboards , main house and toilet blocks
- repaired leaks in the roof over the display tables
- painted the light pole, donga tables and chairs, air strip markers
- re furbished all the signs around the roads into Old Andado

and much more

"OK we said" David and I managed to hold up




To assist in updating your record the following "how to guide" is provided.

1. Login as a member


2. Click on Members button





Goin' Campin'

Mixed berry jaffle



White chocolate & raspberry ricotta jaffle



Ingredients

8 slices white bread 125g Coles brand spreadable cream cheese 1 cup Coles brand fresh frozen mixed berries 100g Cadbury melts real white chocolate, chopped 50g butter, at room temperature lcing sugar, to serve 1/2 cup maple syrup, to serve

Method

Step 1

Preheat a sandwich press. Place the bread on a clean board and spread with cream cheese. Top 4 slices with berries and sprinkle with chocolate. Top with remaining bread, cream-cheese side down. Spread top of each sandwich with butter.

Step 2

Cook each sandwich for 2 mins or until golden and bubbly. Dust with icing sugar and serve with maple syrup.

Ingredients

60g fresh ricotta
20g white chocolate, chopped
2 slices white bread
15g butter, at room temperature
2 tablespoons frozen raspberries
Icing sugar mixture, to dust

Method

Step 1

Preheat a jaffle or sandwich maker. Combine the ricotta and chocolate in a small bowl.

Step 2

Spread one side of each bread slice with butter. Place a slice, butter-side down, in the preheated jaffle maker. Top with the ricotta mixture and sprinkle with raspberries. Top with remaining bread slice, butter side up. Cook for 4-5 minutes or until golden. Remove from jaffle maker and place on a work surface. Slice and dust with icing sugar to serve.
