FOUR WHEEL DRIVE AUSTRALIA CODE OF ETHICS

ST4WDC is affiliated with Four Wheel Drive Australia and we promote responsible four wheel driving. We should all observe and support this Code of Ethics. Remember, image is difficult to change.

- Obey the laws and regulations for Recreational Vehicles that apply to public lands.
- Respect the cultural, heritage and environmental values of public/private land, by obeying restrictions that may apply.
- Respect our flora and fauna. Stop and look, but never disturb.
- Keep to formed vehicle tracks.
- Keep the environment clean. Carry your own, and any other, rubbish out.
- Keep your vehicle mechanically sound and clean to reduce the environmental impact.
- Adopt minimal impact camping and driving practices.
- Seek permission before driving on private land. Do not disturb livestock or watering points, leave gates as found.
- Take adequate water, food, fuel, basic spares and a first aid kit on trips. In remote areas travel with another vehicle and have Royal Flying Doctor Service, or equivalent emergency contact by radio or satellite.
- Plan ahead and lodge trip details with a responsible person.
- Enjoy your recreation and respect the rights of others.
- Support four-wheel drive touring as a legitimate family activity.
- Consider joining an affiliated four-wheel drive Club.

It's been another busy Month for Membership, as people start to come out of hibernation there will more trips /activities up on the calendar.



DO YOU WANT TO BECOME A ST4WDC DRIVING INSTRUCTOR?

The Club's Driver Training Unit (DTU) is intending to commence a new Trainee Driver Trainer cohort next year. We are seeking to appoint three trainee driver trainers who are committed to attending all basic driver training weekends (four a year), the sand and water course weekend, basic and intermediate winching weekends, and intermediate driving weekend (we recognise that we are all volunteers and unavoidable events arise, but a basic commitment is essential to progress as a cohort). Validation is through a final weekend which covers demonstration of driving, demonstration of course delivery, and a theory exam. The minimum time period to complete the trainee driver training program is over two years, but individuals and cohorts can take longer before validation. The DTU aspires to achieve a gender balance within the team, so if you are a lady driver please consider nominating.

To meet the minimum standards required by the club to be approved as a ST4WDC Trainee Instructor, individuals must

- be a current financial member of the club as determined by the Club's By-Laws,
- have been a financial member of the club as determined by the Club's By-Laws for a minimum of two (2) years,
- have participated in a minimum of four club trips to Grade 3 standard or higher within the last two years,
- apply in writing to the Education Coordinator, and therefore Chief Driving Instructor,
- and be approved by the Chief Driving Instructor and the Committee to join the Trainee Program.

HAVE YOU HEARD?

Under the guidance and supervision of the club's Chief Instructor, or their delegated Instructor, a Trainee Instructor will:

- provide general assistance during the Driver Training Courses, including Basic Driver Training, Sand and Water, and Basic and Intermediate Winching courses, and Intermediate Driving course.
- assist with the practical demonstration of course content,
- present sections of the course theory to students, and
- provide practical instruction and guidance to students.

There is a Driver Training Manual provided to Trainees to learn course content and theory delivery.

More information about the program and requirements to be validated as a ST4WDC Driving Instructor can be found on the website. Go to Training Courses/Education Policy/pages 9-11.

If you are interested, please apply in writing to education@ST4WDC.com.au, and could you please confirm that you

- · meet the minimum standards
- are committed to attending training weekends over the two year period
- have read and understood the Education Policy
- and can complete the mandatory aspects of becoming a Driving Instructor, including completion of the supplementary driver training courses as outlined in the Education Policy.



INTERMEDIATE DRIVING COURSE (DIFFICULT TERRAIN) 2023

8-10 September

he DTU recently, and successfully, ran the inaugural Intermediate Driving Course (Difficult Terrain). This course was designed to provide club members the opportunity to continue on from the skills and knowledge imparted in the Basic course and gain additional confidence, strategic thinking, and techniques to tackle more difficult terrain. Participants experienced driving grade 4 conditions with instructors providing guidance and advice where necessary, with the exercises designed around group problem solving, group led solutions, and group led recovery scenarios when appropriate.

That was a fun course. For some it was a major opportunity for refreshing basic and a bit more for others it was being made aware of bad habits that have snuck in.

The course made everyone think and showed that in many cases there was more than 1 possible correct answer to the challenges presented. Good course run by good team of dedicated volunteers.

Thank you for the training over the weekend. I learnt some great new skills that I wouldn't have thought of doing such as using the clutch and the brake in first gear rolling backwards. I got to practise my new skills to help another 4wd out of a tricky situation that was stuck down a hill.



As always, the capability of our vehicles continue to be proven, and really if we didn't 'over think it' as drivers, we might have completed the tracks much sooner. Instructors rotated through the vehicles during the day to support divers as we tackled the various tracks and provided thorough feedback to the group both during and after each of the challenges. I thought the intermediate driving course was a great way to put previous courses into practice on difficult terrain. For example, utilising the key stall on a difficult slope or how to navigate / choose lines that are best for the car. The working B and clearing of trees was a nice way to get to know everyone more. Overall, a great course and the instructors do a great job!

After a cold night, we met in the shed, there we had a theory refresher, which was most welcome, having done my basic training five years ago.

First, we had to perform an exercise of wheel placement, which was quite fun to do. Then the group drove to the first track, then to another, the driving was slow as the tracks were tricky to negotiate. The first really challenging part was driving in a creek's bed, after some tips /guidance from our instructors, talks between ourselves, and the help of spotters, the task was performed more "easily" than first thought.

We kept driving, then we had to do a very step, rocky track with a challenging rocks step, I achieved that part with the help of my winch, thanks to the help from other participants all got set up quickly. Sadly, a participant had some car failure there and had to be winched down the track, again the group did a great job to lower the car safely to the bottom of the track.

The workshop, manual, and checklist are tools to assist TL's better manage a trip. The workshop is run by experienced TL's and covers the following:

- Expectations of trip participants
- Planning a trip
- Trip Proposal
- Running a trip
- Managing member expectations
- Incident management
- Trip reporting

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

NPWS has a new online volunteer management system called VIP. Please follow the instruction below to register in the system. The process should take 5-10 minutes.




