FOUR WHEEL DRIVE AUSTRALIA CODE OF ETHICS

ST4WDC is affiliated with Four Wheel Drive Australia and we promote responsible four wheel driving. We should all observe and support this Code of Ethics. Remember, image is difficult to change.

- Obey the laws and regulations for Recreational Vehicles that apply to public lands.
- Respect the cultural, heritage and environmental values of public/private land, by obeying restrictions that may apply.
- Respect our flora and fauna. Stop and look, but never disturb.
- Keep to formed vehicle tracks.
- Keep the environment clean. Carry your own, and any other, rubbish out.
- Keep your vehicle mechanically sound and clean to reduce the environmental impact.
- Adopt minimal impact camping and driving practices.
- Seek permission before driving on private land. Do not disturb livestock or watering points, leave gates as found.
- Take adequate water, food, fuel, basic spares and a first aid kit on trips. In remote areas travel with another vehicle and have Royal Flying Doctor Service, or equivalent emergency contact by radio or satellite.
- Plan ahead and lodge trip details with a responsible person.
- Enjoy your recreation and respect the rights of others.
- Support four-wheel drive touring as a legitimate family activity.
- Consider joining an affiliated four-wheel drive Club.





See you on the tracks.



Trip Report: Abercrombie River National Park 2023

26-27 August

bercrombie National Park has been closed for nearly two years due to flood damage and track remediation so my plan to visit this park has been on the backburner for a long time. We departed Canberra with eighteen trucks broken into two convoys with myself leading the first and Shae the second. Unfortunately while transiting through Goulburn I received a phone call from Shae that his truck had gone into limp mode and he has to disengage. So go and find the second convoy and all meet up at Bumaroo for a comfort break but no morning tea. I was a bit slack in my organising this trip regarding fuel capacity and petrol vehicles (assumptions being made re petrol and Diesel). A particular note that I had changed on this trip was not stopping at Goulburn at the bakery as If I allowed trip participants to get out of their vehicles it would be like herding cats to round everybody up. My main goal was to be able to spend as much time in the National Park. But allowances was made for morning and afternoon teas with Scones and fresh cream

A final note the Glen will soon be open to the general public.

The following are the comments form the trip participants.




I've been wanting to visit Abercrombie River National Park a long time but never did, so with the Park finally reopening after several years of closure I was really keen to do this trip. It's always nice when going to new places to be able to tag along with a leader knows the area. Well, that was the theory until poor Shae had to return home with vehicle troubles and Michael volunteered me take over Shae's convoy. Serves me right for being the only smartass to download the GPX files, not that I mind because being leader means I get to go up front and out of the dust. It also means I have to read the map correctly and keep to the route, which I managed pretty well with only a few small corrections along the way.

Day 1 after arriving at The Glen we set out in two convoys with Michael's group doing the western loop and my group doing the eastern loop, then on Day 2 we swapped. The tracks were mostly easy but very scenic and took us through all of Abercrombie's public campgrounds. Of these I think Silent Creek was the best and had the most space. One side track took us to Ledingham's Hut which was particularly interesting due to the wattle and daub construction, basically mud hand-packed into the frame and held in place by rough cut slats. Unlike most historic huts, this one doesn't appear to be maintained in any way and with the wall material unlined and exposed to the elements will likely deteriorate very quickly, so I felt fortunate at getting to see it while it's still there (dead pigs notwithstanding!).

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
